

DEBA RIVER ESTUARY

To recover the wetlands in the Casacampo area, some lezones have been removed, thus allowing the circulation of water and recovering intertidal spaces on which species typical of the marsh have been replanted. At low tide, the small invertebrates that live in the mud attract migratory birds that, such as the gray heron, the common egret or waders, find a resting place in the marsh.

On the other side of the estuary, the Artzabal plain has preserved an important maritime reed bed for centuries. More recently, next to the reedbed, a freshwater pool has been regenerated that facilitates the development of the reedbed, a tall grass with dense growth that offers an extraordinary refuge for small birds such as the common warbler.

Already at the mouth of the estuary, on the beach, marram plantations have been made, a colonizing grass that tries to fix the sand and recover the profile of the coastal dune.
